LENTEN AND EASTER GREETINGS FROM YOUR NOW HEALTHY PROVINCIAL DELEGATE, FR PATRICK FARRELL, OCD:

I forget who it was, but I remember reading the statement,"I have been rich and I have been poor. And I much prefer being rich." My version of it is, "I have been healthy and I have been sick. And, honestly, I prefer being healthy." While "sick" I visited 14 OCDS groups during December and January. So, God did not trust me being virtuous as a sick Carmelite for too long.

St Teresa of Avila pointed out somewhere in her <u>Way of Perfection</u> or <u>Life</u> that those who are sick can pray just as well as those who are enjoying good health.

In the second reading for her feastday (Letter to the Romans 8:14-17 & 26-27) we read:

The spirit too comes to help us in our weakness. For when we cannot choose words in order to pray properly, the Spirit himself expresses our plea in a way that could never be put into words, and God who knows everything in our hearts knows perfectly well what He means, and that the pleas of the saints expressed by the Spirit are according to the mind of God.



ABOUT PREPARATION FOR THE NEXT MILLENIUM. . .

St Teresa of Avila saw herself as a daughter of the Church. Therese of Lisieux referred to herself as a Child of the Church. So, you know what would be their Teresian Carmelite reaction to the request of Pope John Paul II to all to give a Christian tone to the expectation of the next millenium.

1996was the last preparation year before the launching of, the three decisive years of vigorous evangelization and catechetics which will determine if we will be drawn into the current of grace by the year 2000, into the century of great evangelization and religion for which the Pope prays and suffers.

1997Year One - "Jesus Christ, the one Savior of the world, yesterday, today, and forever" (Heb 13:8)

*Penetration of the mystery of the Incarnation and of the mystery of the Lessed Virgin Mary's Divine Motherhood and her role as the model of faith.

*Renewed appreciation of the Sacrament of Baptism, its commission for all to evangelize, and its foundation for communion among all Christians.

*Renewed interest in Sacred Scripture and in striving for holiness.

*Detailed sutdy of the Catechich of the Catholic Church and emphasis on the theological virture of Faith.

1998 will be an emphasis on the Holy Spirit, the eternal source of every gift that comes from God.

1999 will emphasize God the Father, Who leads us on the "pilgrimage that takes place in the heart of each person, extends next to the believing community, then reaches to the whole of humanity."

2000 the Jubilee Year. .. "The aim will be to give glory to the Trinity, from Whom everything in the world and in history comes and to Whom everything returns."

A JIGSAW PUZZLE OF ST THERESE?
In honor of the centenary of the death of
St. Therese some monasteries of Discalced
Carmelite Nuns have put out wonderful
calendars.

The Discalced Carmelite Nuns of the Detroit area (actually now a few miles north of Detroit:35750 Moravian Drive, Clinton Twp,MI 48035-2138) are soon to make available to religious article stores, other monasteries, Secular Order groups, and other places that want puzzles by the carton, a jigsaw puzzle showing the ten portraits of St Therese.

This is a project which is at once inspiring, educationa', and enjoyable. In short, just plain fun, yet at the same time lifts up the heart to God and His works, and encourages people to learn about the spiritual life.

There will be a booklet with the 21 inch in diameter puzzle. It will use the ten portraits of St Therese to trace the development of Therese's spiritual life and the developing of the Little Way.

Having seen the circular painting that will be converted into a puzzle, I myself look forward to its availability. After it is put together, and sealed, it will make an excellent piece to hang on the wall, reminding me and others of the various photos of St Therese and her development into a great saint at such ar early age—but in stages. It should be available by April.

BACK TO THE GOSPEL, THE MESSAGE OF ST THERESE OF LISIEUX. . . A letter from the O.Carm and OCD Superiors General on the occasion of the Centenary of the death of St Therese of Lisieux. . .

Eventually I will get copies of this 36 page document to the leadership of all the Communities/Groups in my jurisdiction. But, for now, let me quote one of its valuable passages:

28. Faithful to the Rule, Therese meditated day and night on the law of the Lord, and kept watch in prayer. Like her spiritual mother Teresa of Jesus, she found in Jesus a living book, and in imitation of St John of the Cross, she "fixed her eyes on Christ." Cf Story of A Soul VIII (Manuscript A,83V) or Catechism of the Catholic Church, 127.

MORE QUESTIONS TO APPLY ST TERESA'S WAY OF PERFECTION TO YOUR LIFE:

Ch 17, n.3

A.) When do you practise "meditation"—or, a thinking/talking-to-God kind of prayer? And, if you run out of things to say, do you combine that kind of prayer with reading from a book to help you? And, is the book one of the gospels? Are you one of the "many" that St Teresa speaks of?

Or, are you one that shuts off the light for the prayer of snoozing?

(Better to sleep than to experience aridity, right?) But, Teresa suggested using a book—which you can't read in holy darkness! Do you need your darkness—with a flickering candle? Or do you need to press the reset—button of your prayer life called a book?

- B.)Or, are you someone who can't "meditate"? Are you one of those who are "able only to pray vocally"? If so, so you try to make your vocal or formula prayers as much yours as you can, so that they are real prayers, not just verbal gibberish? For example, do you notice the words when you pray them—like the "now" in the Hail Mary?
- C.)Or, are you one of those people (at present) with "minds so active they cannot dwell on one thing"?

If so, do you have a "thousand absurdities, scruples, and doubts"?

(Can the evil spirit employ any better trick than that to pull you away from prayer efforts?)
And, do you ask yourself why you don't have the delights in prayer that some others talk about?

Do you understand that these others did not merit their delights in prayer, but were the recipients of GIFTS from God-based on their needs and God's generosity to alleviate those needs?

- D.) Not to get the "delights" in prayer that others seem to receive may:
- (1) make you proud (= upset that God deals with someone so deserving as wonderful you), or
- (2) it may make you humble (=ready to receive any graces/helps/de-lights when <u>God</u> chooses to give them). Which is safer?
- E.) If, when you are praying, meditating (talking-thinking prayer) to God, AND you experience certain delights. . . do you feel: (1) you have earned them? (=pride) or (2) you have received something wonderful from God and you really don't know how to thank Jesus?

Ch 17, n4:

- F.) In this paragraph do you read the reassuring words of Teresa for those who have not received special favors in prayer?
- G>)Do you feel you should be cautious about your "tears", lest they be not all that perfect? Or, do you feel that you have a long way to go, because you do not have the gift of tears? What does Teresa say to the likes of you?

Ch 17, n5:

H.) For people who haven't read or who have forgotten this part of the Way of Perfection, and presume all can easily be contemplative, and the rest are good-fornothing,...what were the advantages of St Martha?

Ch 17 n6:

- I.) How should the Martha types handle things today? Will you consider how true humility consists in great readiness to be content with whatever the Lord may want to do with you? And, what does He seem
- to want to do with you? --Forget those others!
- J.) Have you found yourself feeling unworthy to be called His servant?

Ouestions on Way cont:

K.)To use Teresa's own question:
"If contemplating, practicing mental and vocal prayer, taking care of the sick, helping with household chores, and working even at the lowliest tasks are all ways of serving the Guest who comes to be with us and eat and recreate, what difference doe it make whether we serve in the one way or the other?"

Ch 17, n 7:

L.)Prayerful people may verv seem to prefer contemplation with its delights to the Cross with its pains. To which are you closer at this moment: smooth contemplation or rough Cross?

M.) Does it console you to realize that your divine Friend, Jesus, may be inviting you to carry a heavy cross? Or do you-like Jesus in the garden of Gethsemane --feel like arguing with God, "let this chalice pass?

Ch 18, n1:

A.) Some people seem to think that one can reach a plateau of wonderful contemplative delights and be free of the Cross. How does Teresa see the two joined? Do you worry when you experience great delights that you may soon have a great cross?

Ch 18, n2:

B.) In your Christian life, have you thought that you were lost and must begin again?

C.) If you consider yourself sort of contemplative, do you feel courageous and determined to suffer or unafraid of trials? If so, did you first feel weak and in need of special help from God—maybe just to survive?

May you have a peaceful Lent as you change what you should for the better, and a HAPPY EASTER!

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
