AUGUST LETTER FROM -- FR PATRICK FARRELL, PROVINCIAL DELEGATE FOR THE MIDWEST PART OF THE WASHINGTON PROVINCE:
Dear Members of The Secular Order and supportive friends,

Before this month is over, St Therese Martin, the Little Flower, may be declared a Doctor of the universal Church. How can this be? She did not go to college or even finish highschool. But she has a message for all of us now and for years to come: she was greatest at her moments of weakness and inadequacy. Because. . . then she counted on God's action and help.

There is much St Therese can teach all of us--especially in our moments of weakness, inability, frustration, etc.. But, may I share an experience where just her scribblings of the late 1800s were a help to me?

I was a college student at our then House of Philosophy here at Holy Hill. Three of us students were sent into Milwaukee to a big vocation rally where we had our Discalced Carmelite booth.

I grumbled and grouched the whole way in, saying how I could not speak in public. I was too shy. Why was I assigned?

Then, when we arrived, one brother grabbed the slide presentation task. The other declared he would explain to people the big back wall with its pictures of Carmel around the world. I was in trouble!

Where did that leave me, the shy one? With only a glass-covered photostatic set of St Therese's original writings—in notebooks, etc.. So, as young people came up, I thought I would save myself by asking, "Is your hand-writing anything like hers?" Then they would ask about her.

As I spoke about her, I suddenly realized that, for the first time in my life, I had no trouble with self-consciousness. I knew that, later on, I would never have trouble speaking in public—due to the photostatic relics of St Therese.

All that was needed was (1) something to say, (2) people to share it with, and (3) just to do it. (cont. on next page)

All the mechanics of "speaking from your diaphram," etc. were counter-productive with people like me, and with some of you!

The reason I am sharing this: in almost every OCDS Community or forming Community, there is someone with something worth sharing. But, like myself before that Therese handwriting experience, they are too timid.

And the whole OCDS Community, big or small, loses.

I am a living proof that you do not have to be a great orator to share something simple but important with others.

On the other hand, there are some who are not only not shy, but have time-consuming material and information that has nothing to do with Teresian Carmelite spirituality.

I beg the local leadership to inform such that everyone only has limited time for Teresian Carmelite spirituality at a monthly meeting, so those with a separate cause or agenda should be restricted to the time after the meeting is finished.

I have personally witnessed people coming to a meeting only to promote a non-carmelite retreat or some other private devotion or apparition. Then you don't see them again till they have a new hidden agenda for their presence!

Let them put their literature on a table where you can pick it up afterwards, if you choose. They may have something worth—while. But it should not replace your short time to learn and share Teresian Carmelite spirituality. --Fr. Pat, OCD

Now here is a report on our Washington province's "eastern" regional congress in Huntington, NY. Ruby Alexander was both our midwestern Secretary for the Isolates but also our midwestern Secular representative at the National Secretariat which preceded the actual Congress:

The Long Island Congress June 12-15th 1997 was in honor of St Therese of Lisieux' First Centenary. The congress was well attended, there were secular Carmelites from each of the provinces, Guam, the Virgin Islands, and Jamaica.

Anne Engo and her committee did an out-

standing job with the hospitality and all of the little amenities that make functions of this nature a success. Anne even found time to meet the flights of Gerald Alford (OK province rep) and myself. As we were about to leave the airport, I casually said I had never been to Manhattan; that was enough to get us dinner in Manhattan and a minitour. It was far beyond the call. I cannot thank Anne enough.

The opening liturgy on Thursday was in honor of the Holy Spirit. There was a very good choir for that Mass and the Spirit was truly present.

Fr. Patrick Farrell, OCD, gave the opening lecture. His delivery was exceptionally good; he was so good until when another scheduled speaker was unable to get to the congress because of New York's traffic, Fr. Patrick was pressed into service again.

There was also a wine and cheese social on Thursday evening, where old friends could renew friendships and new friends could gather and talk about things Carmel.... Each presenter was well prepared. I can't begin to tell you what a wonderful experience the Congress was:

On Saturday morning we were taken on a bus trip to the shrine of Our Lady of the Island, conducted by the Montfort Missionaries. Our Lady's statue is 18 ft tall atop a rock that is more than 30ft high.

This shrine is located near the area where Pam Am flight 800 went down.

I am sure most of us said a prayer for the souls on that flight and their families during the liturgy that was celebrated there for us.

The Mass was outside and we were seated beneath our heavenly Mother. The morning was lovely. The back drop was the Atlantic ocean. What a Congress!

Though virtually unknown when she died as a young Carmelite nun at the age of 24 on September 30, 1897, Thérèse of Lisieux has gone on to become one of the most popular and influential saints of modern times. Her autobiography has been translated into dozens of languages, and has inspired millions. Her doctrine of the "little way" of spiritual childhood, and her message of absolute confidence in God's merciful love, have changed the face of contemporary spirituality. People of all faiths and none have felt the power of her promise to send "a shower of roses" after her death, and attribute countless favors to her intercession. She will soon be declared "Doctor of the Church," only the third woman so honored.

n the weekend of September 26-28, 1997, to mark the centenary of Thérèse's death, the Washington Province of Discalced Carmelites will host a gala celebration in and around the Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception and the Catholic University of America in Washington, DC. The weekend will include performances of the opera "Dialogues of the Carmelites," the premiere of a new documentary on Thérèse, lectures and conferences by noted Theresian experts, exhibits on the Saint, and optional trips to local Carmelite sites. The highlight of the weekend will be a solemn closing Mass on Saturday, September 27, at 3 PM, with Cardinal James Hickey of Washington as presider and Bishop Patrick V. Ahern of New York as homilist; the choir of Little Flower Parish in Bethesda, MD, will perform "Canticle of Love," composed for the centenary by Sr. Marie Thérèse Sokol, OCD, of the Seattle Carmel. The gospel choir of St. Teresa of Avila Parish in Washington, DC, will also sing.
