Update from the OCDS Provincial Council

The Program entails each Community in the Province to be visited once every three (3) years and visitators would be assigned so that travel would <u>not</u> require an overnight stay. The term for Visitators is expected to be three (3) years.

Book of Documents Corrections

As in all major endeavors, one can expect challenges and snags. We have, with your help, identified some issues and hope in the future to be able to collect sufficient information to systematically correct any errors or omissions. As St. Paul once described, this is a" thorn" that keeps us from getting proud!

In this section of the newsletter we would like to address the Book of Documents; more specifically an entry kindly provided by John Bayer, OCDS of St John of the Cross Community in Ann Arbor, MI. In reviewing the Book of Documents, Mr. Bayer found areas where corrections should be noted.

First, the Constitutions numbering in the Book of Documents (BOD) has combined paragraph 18 and 19 into only paragraph 18, even though both are shown to be the same revision. All references to the Constitutions following paragraph 19 are thus off by one. For example, in Statute 77, the reference to (Const. #24c) should be to #23c within the BOD.

Secondly, the Constitution's callout of references/footnotes in the BOD tried to renumber all the footnotes to a new 'black ink' only numbered sequence. The website footnotes are numbered as follows: Black 1-20, Red 1-27, Black 21-29, Red 28-32 and Black 30-47, the subtotal is 47 Black plus 32 Red equaling a total of 79 footnotes. The BOD lists a total of only 76 footnotes.

Continuing on the subject of the footnotes within the Constitutions; on page 27, the BOD is missing callouts for footnotes Red #2 and Red #3, causing everything to be off by two. Footnote Red #4 is labeled as #22 in the BOD. Reference #22 belongs to footnote Red #2; this is the start of where things begin to be off by two.

Moving forward, BOD footnote #33 should be part of footnote #32, causing the footnote numbering to be off by three at this point. BOD footnote #46 actually contains both Red #25 and Red #26, putting footnote numbering back to being off by two. The BOD has not include Red #32 so the footnote numbering is now off by one.

Additional reference callouts are missing from the BOD as follows: Footnote Black #42 (CIC 309), Black footnote #43 (CIC 319) and footnote Black #47 (LG 38, which is the same as the previous footnote).

Third, in the BOD Constitutions Reference Section the following was found: On page 159, missing BOD's footnote #56 is the same as online footnote Black #29 (RM37). Also on page 159, footnote #57 is shown as footnote #56. The footnote is actually online Red #28. Thus footnote #58 is mislabeled as footnote #57. The numbering continues as such until footnote #61 where the internal number is correct again. Page 169 is missing Red #32. (Online has the quote and reference). Continuing on page 169, reference #60 for RM #37, presents a good discussion though the reference was not found and is not the title of reference #60 or #61.

The correct references within the Book of Documents in relation to the Statute section are as follows: On page 211, the heading before Statute 76, (cf. Const. #58g) should be #57g. In Statute 77, the reference to (Const. #24c) should be #23c. (This is verified by the exact same quote at the top of page 29, in Const. #23c).

Making pencil margin notes might be helpful.
